

# New York City Ballet Returns to Chicago for First Time in Nearly Two Decades as Part of Harris Theater for Music and Dance Anniversary Season

# NYCB pairs foundational works from Balanchine and Robbins with contemporary choreography from Abraham, Peck, Tanowitz and Wheeldon in the Company's first return to the Harris stage since 2006 performances

Chicago, IL, March 7, 2024 – This month, **The Joan W. and Irving B. Harris Theater for Music and Dance** will welcome **New York City Ballet (NYCB)** for four days of performances as part of the Harris' 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary season. NYCB's long-anticipated return to Chicago is exemplative of the Harris' commitment to bring pioneering artists from around the globe to Chicago, in addition to supporting its world-class Resident Companies. NYCB will present three dynamic programs that bridge past and present—*An Evening with New York City Ballet, Masters at Work: Balanchine + Robbins,* and **21<sup>st</sup> Century** *Choreography*—pairing classical favorites by **George Balanchine** and **Jerome Robbins** with work from contemporary talents **Kyle Abraham, Justin Peck, Pam Tanowitz,** and **Christopher Wheeldon.** Helmed by **Artistic Director Jonathan Stafford** and **Associate Artistic Director Wendy Whelan**—both of whom were NYCB Principal Dancers when the Company last took the stage at the Harris Theater nearly 20 years ago—NYCB returns to the Harris during its own milestone season: the Company's 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary. NYCB's three programs will run from **Wednesday, March 20**, to **Saturday, March 23**.

"The New York City Ballet's 2006 performance at the Harris marked a pivotal moment in our institutional history—the beginning of our *Harris Theater Presents* series, which has continued in full force over the past 18 years and has helped to solidify the Harris as an anchor of Chicago's arts ecosystem," says **Lori Dimun, Alexandra C. and John D. Nichols President and CEO of the Harris.** "To welcome the company back in such a landmark year—and to have Wendy and Jonathan return for these public performances and our anniversary celebration—is a truly remarkable full circle moment. This programming looks towards the future while paying homage to the bedrock of our organizations; I can think of nothing more fitting than this particular blend of classical and contemporary ballet and live music."

"New York City Ballet is thrilled to return to Chicago during our 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary season with repertory favorites by our co-founding choreographers George Balanchine and Jerome Robbins, and 21st-century works created by four of today's most acclaimed choreographers," says **Jonathan Stafford, Artistic Director of NYCB**. "We are grateful to the Harris for inviting us to return during our diamond anniversary year and are looking forward to introducing a new generation of NYCB dancers to Chicago audiences."

For the Harris performances, NYCB will be dancing works from the repertoires of two foundational choreographers, including **George Balanchine**'s *The Four Temperaments* and *Serenade*, as well as Jerome **Robbins**' *In the Night*. In the *21*<sup>st</sup> *Century Choreography* program, NYCB highlights a new generation of iconic choreographers: Justin Peck, Pam Tanowitz, Christopher Wheeldon, and Kyle Abraham. Peck's *Partita*, featuring eight dancers in sneakers, takes inspiration from its score, Caroline Shaw's Pulitzer Prizewinning a cappella *Partita for 8 Voices*, and includes set design by the artist Eva LeWitt. *Partita* marks Peck's 22<sup>nd</sup> piece created for NYCB, where he was a former Soloist, and now serves as Resident Choreographer and Artistic Advisor. His work was most recently seen in Chicago in February with his production of *Illinoise* at Chicago Shakespeare Theater. Shaw's music makes another appearance in Pam

Tanowitz's **Gustave le Gray No. 1**, in which four dancers interact with an onstage pianist. Tanowitz is the founder of Pam Tanowitz Dance, an internationally celebrated post-modern dance company. Wheeldon's **Liturgy**, set to music by Arvo Pärt, is a contemplative pas de deux with a hushed, mystical quality. Wheeldon is a former NYCB Resident Choreographer who performed with the Company for seven years. Recent performances of his work in Chicago include The Joffrey Ballet's annual holiday production of *The Nutcracker* at the Lyric Opera House, and *MJ the Musical*, which he directed and choreographed, at the James M. Nederlander Theatre last fall. Finally, in **Love Letter (on shuffle)**, MacArthur Fellow Kyle Abraham's work for 16 dancers features music by the Grammy Award-winning singer and producer James Blake. The work of Abraham, who creates for his own acclaimed dance company A.I.M as well as other companies around the world, was most recently seen in Chicago by Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater at the Auditorium Theatre and by Hubbard Street Dance Chicago at the Museum of Contemporary Art, both last March.

New York City Ballet Principal Dancers for the Harris Theater performances are scheduled to include: Tyler Angle, Chun Wai Chan, Adrian Danchig-Waring, Emilie Gerrity, Joseph Gordon, Anthony Huxley, Isabella LaFreniere, Sara Mearns, Roman Mejia, Mira Nadon, Tiler Peck, Unity Phelan, Taylor Stanley, Peter Walker, Indiana Woodward, and Andrew Veyette. All performances will be accompanied by the New York City Ballet Orchestra.

On Wednesday, March 20, 2024, the New York City Ballet will perform an exclusive program at the Harris Theater's 20th anniversary celebration *An Evening with New York City Ballet*. The performance will feature works from both programs, including *Serenade, Liturgy*, and *Partita*, after which guests with tickets to the seated dinner will adjourn to the Art Institute of Chicago for an evening of celebration and support for the Harris.
